#### A Story of the Difference You Made to a Man and His Dog



Richard and Cloud have been a familiar sight at the Guest House for many years. Richard, a 64-year-old retired Army Ranger, lives alone on a reservation hundreds of miles away. His fluffy 80-pound American Eskimo mix is a source of comfort and companionship, helping ease the isolation and depression that commonly afflicts

guests who come from rural communities. The special bond between the two is evident when witnessing Cloud's pleasing personality, quietly ready to respond to the needs of his owner. "That's a good boy," says Richard as he pats Cloud's head and settles in for the night.

Together, they travel five hours one way for Richard to receive care, usually by train or rides from friends. The distance may be far, but it's care he cannot do without.

Richard's doctors discovered he had lung cancer as they prepared to perform open-heart surgery. The surgery was immediately canceled and aggressive chemotherapy began. The cancer spread quickly and his condition continued to deteriorate. When he returned for his latest round of treatment in January, Richard knew he was in for a long hospitalization...he didn't if know he would survive. Yet this was not what troubled him. It was Cloud. What would happen to his beloved four-legged family member if he was no longer around to provide for him?

His faith in a higher power gave him strength and a gift greater than he could have imagined. During his stays, Richard met his angel, Sal. They quickly formed

a connection and Sal promised that she would care for Cloud no matter the outcome. Richard could now turn his attention to a greater fight. As Richard battled cancer and the effects of chemotherapy, he looked



forward to his visits from Cloud: a special gift only made possible by Sal's kind heart. His health continued to decline but his spirits were always raised when he was able to see his faithful pup.

Richard ultimately lost his battle with cancer. Yet, because of you, his dying wish was granted: a loving home for Cloud.

Today, Cloud is often seen walking the Veterans Guest House neighborhood with his new keeper.
