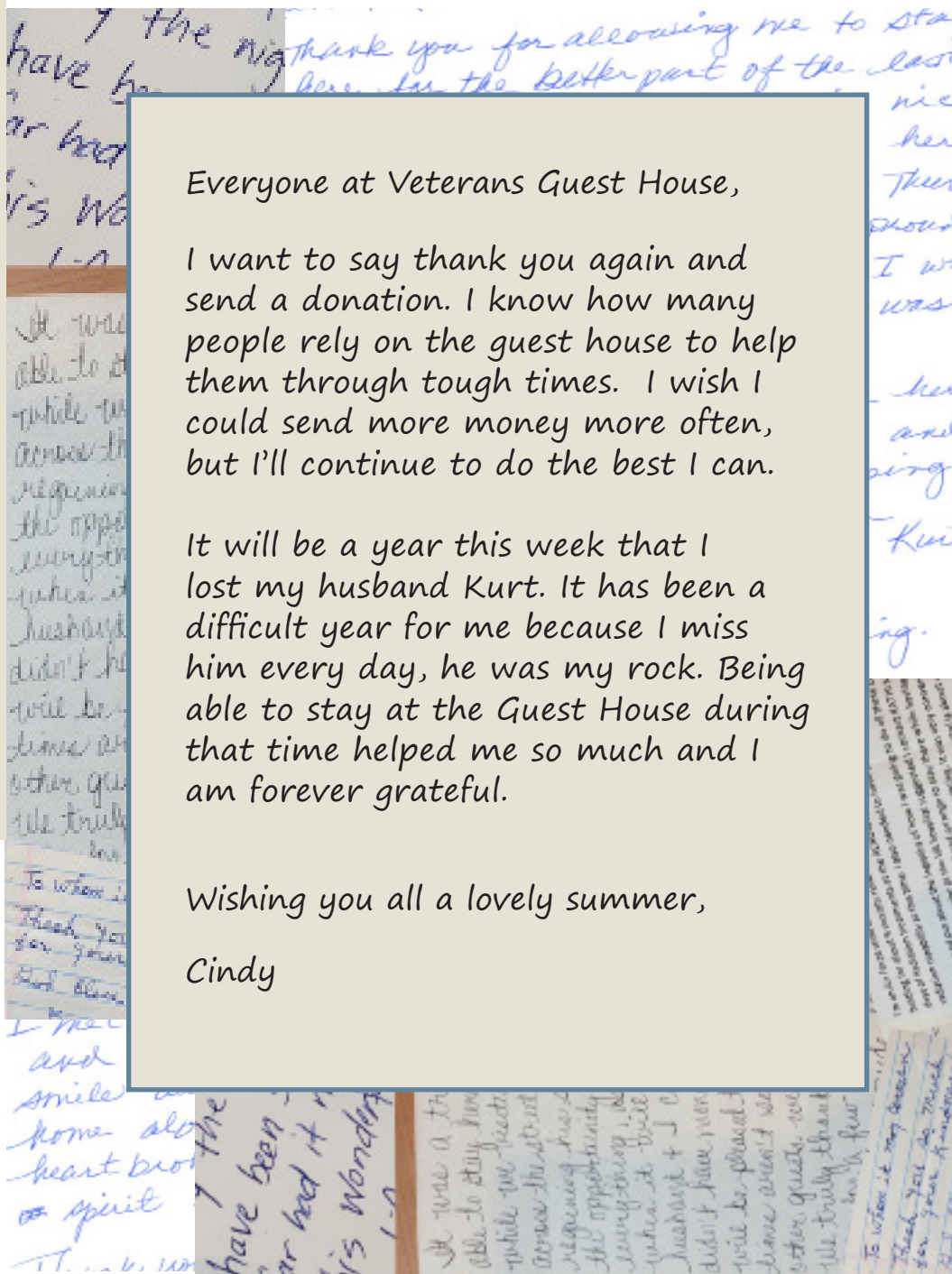


Letters From Home

Veterans Face Barriers at the Pump

Dewey, an Air Force veteran, travels more than 100 miles one-way from Lovelock to receive his medical care. Like many VGH guests, he relies on rides from friends, family, or services to help him get to Reno. When his last appointment for the day ran late, the shuttle service he used for his ride in, left without him. On Friday afternoon, he had no way to get home. Eric, a VGH maintenance volunteer, was at the Guest House when he learned about Dewey being stranded. Without hesitation he accepted the job to return his fellow veteran back home.

Dewey is one of the 600 VGH guests who struggle with transportation each year. Many veterans have been forced to cancel treatments because they did not have the means to get to their destination or were uncertain about how they would return home. With rising gas prices, a greater number of veterans are being forced to decide between their health and saving money for day-to-day needs.

That was the case for Air Force veteran Terry who cancelled his doctor's appointment when he realized he did not have the gas money to travel the 240 miles from McDermott to Reno. Sam, an Army veteran, remained at VGH for a week because the cost to travel back and forth from Fernley between his appointments simply wasn't an option. The stories continue and requests for help are becoming more frequent.

With your help, VGH is working hard to help veterans and their families gain access to the care they need. In partnership with Reno Elks Lodge 597, volunteer drivers are helping with local transportation. This group of hometown heroes are also hosting wish-list drives to help with everyday essentials for our guests, such as groceries and hygiene items.

Donations of gas cards, taxi/ride sharing vouchers have served as a life-line for military families who need a little extra help getting to their medical appointments. Requests for assistance are expected to grow and many veterans have expressed concern about how they will make ends meet as costs continue to rise. Vietnam Veteran Spends Final Days Surrounded by Loved Ones

You helped three generations of grieving family members gather together for their beloved veteran

Vietnam Veteran Tommy and his wife Susie have traveled from Bishop to Reno for the past decade. During those many years making the four-hour, one-way drive for medical care, neither would have imagined that Veterans Guest House would be the place where their entire family would gather during Tommy's final days. Wife Susie, their daughter, granddaughter, and other family members stayed at the guest house as Tommy's health took a turn for the worse. Not having to worry about lodging gave the family the ability to spend every minute they had at the bedside of their loved one. Tommy fought hard every day because he knew his family was there with him or nearby.

While the days were long and hard, there were brief moments of joy sprinkled in. Tommy's four-year-old granddaughter would use couch cushions to build forts in the living room. The sounds of her tiny feet could be heard pitter patter when she ran up and down the hall with guests when waiting for dinner. Those moments would soon pass. The little blond-haired girl sobbed when

she was told that grandpa was gone. Tommy the proud veteran, community leader, and kind man treasured his family. When time was running short the most important people in his life were by his side. They were grateful for the comfort and respite provided by Veterans Guest House.

Tommy had the love and support of his family in his final days. And his family, in turn, was given the care and peace they needed. With a safe place and a caring community, their healing has begun, and an undeniable bond has been created. Tommy's family sadly packed their bags and headed back to a new reality full of adjustments; but they know when a medical need arises, they will be welcomed back with open arms to the place that will always serve as their safe and comforting temporary home.
