

How You Kept Veterans Safe Against Wildfires

Thor, a 70 year old Army Veteran arrived at Veterans Guest House, filthy, exhausted, and defeated. He spent hours and all the energy he had desperately trying to save his home from being engulfed by the raging Caldor and Dixie Fires that burned nearly 1 million acres and forced nearly 50,000 neighbors to find emergency accommodations. After a long hot shower, a home cooked meal, and one nights rest, he was a new man.

Many evacuees began pouring into the Northern Nevada area this summer only to find hotels, motels and short-term rentals already booked with vacationers attending local community special events. Reports of price gouging started to escalate as people began to search for emergency shelter. It didn't take long for evacuation centers to reach capacity and were at risk of having to turn needy families away.

Thanks to your generosity, Veterans Guest House was able to answer the call and provide shelter for veterans like Thor who were displaced from their homes. John, a 93 year old, WWII Navy veteran and longtime Tahoe resident was also relieved to have a familiar place to flee when mandatory evacuation went into effect. Other families shared similar gratitude and relief after trying to care for a disabled veteran family member while living out of a 5th wheel during the emergency evacuation.

Evacuees were given a safe place to rest while anxiously awaiting news about the fate of their property; had it survived the fire and when or if they could return home.

Not everyone received good news. Thor and another family lost everything to the fires, forcing both veterans to move out of state to stay with family. Your support

gave them an unexpected home and peace of mind while they overcame the devastating loss and worked to put their lives together. With your help, the Veterans Guest House expanded its outreach and served as refuge for frightened veterans and their families. Thank you for giving veterans like Thor hope and a welcoming place to stay during a devastating time. Your involvement keeps guests healthy and safe.

Guest Profile: A Grateful Veteran Since the Beginning



When Todd, a 79 year old Army veteran, recalls returning home from his enlistment, he remembers a different reception than the hero's welcome other generations have received. He was drafted in the Army in 1964, training in guided missile electronics. During arguably one of the most turbulent times in our country's history, society was divided in their sentiment for servicemembers and how to support them. Following his service, Todd attended college and graduate school using the GI bill, eventually working for McDonald on the space capsule.

While Todd says he is proud of his service, he emphasizes that having resources like VGH shows how much others also appreciate the sacrifices he made. He and his wife Susan have been coming to the corner of Taylor and Locust since the early '90's when the original "Spouse House" opened its doors and welcomed veterans in need of medical care. Born with "wings on their feet" the couple travels the world together and calls Mexico home. They travel twice a year to the Reno/Sparks area to receive medical care. Although is not the most

convenient location, VGH makes it their preferred choice. "It is encouraging to see how much this community does to make veterans lives better," he says.

He has witnessed first-hand the incredible growth of VGH. With it, he relates how times have changed over the years, and the distrust that many veterans felt during '60's and '70's has transformed into a newfound appreciation for their service. Thanks to your generosity, each year 3,000 veterans like Todd are given a comfortable, cheerful place to stay while they receive the care they need. Todd has made what he calls "a heart connection" with other veterans he meets here. They sit across the dinner table and share a meal and many times they just bond. There is no talk about their time in the service or politics or failing health. Instead, they discuss what they're doing to make the world better, grandchildren and how very fortunate they are. Similar to his time in the military, Todd has created special friendships with others he may never see again. He thinks fondly about his friend Richard that he met here that is now living in Vietnam and the kinship they formed.
